"Many years have passed since the exploration... and the memory of the men and their heroic deeds, the men and their generous acts, overwhelms me with a joy that seems almost a grief, for it starts a fountain of tears. I was a maimed man; my right arm was gone; and these brave men, these good men, never forgot it. In every danger my safety was their first care, and in every waking hour some kind service was rendered me, and they transfigured my misfortune into a boon"

~*Major John Wesley Powell*, from the introduction to The Exploration of the Colorado River and Its Canyons

This play, *Men on Boats*, is many things. It is a fantastical adventure. It is a tale of friendships formed and lost. It is the depiction of an incredible journey, and the rising cost of completing it.

It is also a story of truth.

These intrepid men ventured into the perceived "unknown" and emerged forever changed in the pursuit of knowledge, of acquisition, of glory.

It's thanks to Major Powell's meticulous journal keeping that we have the information we do from the first expedition into this new frontier. It helped that it was, at its core, a scientific pursuit, making record keeping something of a necessity. The record keeping would also prove useful when the remaining members of the expedition left the canyon and found themselves declared dead in several newspaper publications.

For some, this was true. But for tonight, they will live again.

So we will begin with truth and end with truth. The middle is more complicated, but there are things we *know*. The boats really did carry the names *Emma Dean*, *Maid of the Canyon*, *Kitty Clyde's Sister*, and *No-Name*. Powell lost an arm due to an injury received while fighting in the Civil War. Old Shady really did indulge in song, his voice a welcome one. A cryptic warning was found inscribed upon a rock. Bradley's pants really were used for heroic action. The magnificence of Dunn's hair was remarked upon by Powell himself in flowing prose. There were achingly long portages. There were rattlesnakes. There were boats capsized. There were three men lost and never truly recovered.

We welcome you for the highs and the lows. The terrifying currents and the gentlest of swells. The warmth of the campfire after a hard day on the river.

Oars up. Oars out. Let's begin.

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
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GUEST INFORMATION

The Playhouse strives to make its facility and performances accessible to all guests. Our theatres are wheelchair accessible. Service animals are welcome. Assisted listening devices are available in the John Viars Theatre. If your hearing aid has a T-coil, toggle to that setting to receive the audio signal directly without any headset or other equipment needed. ASL interpreted performances and audio description performances are available upon request. Closed captioning is available in the John Viars Theatre via GalaPro. The GalaPro app is available for free in the Apple App Store and Google Play Store. For these and other needs, please call the ticket office with specific service requests.

Cameras

The taking of photographs and the use of recording devices are not allowed during a performance and are a violation of state and federal copyright laws.

Cancellations

If a show is cancelled due to bad weather, an email will be sent to ticket holders. Cancellations will be noted on the phone system, website, and social media sites. Tickets for a cancelled performance may be exchanged for another performance. Please be sure the ticket office has your email information and current phone in the event a performance is cancelled. The Playhouse does not sell its contacts.

Companion Restroom

A companion restroom is located on the lower level across from the coatrack.

Concessions

Latecomers will be seated at an appropriate break in the play. Lobby chimes are sounded five minutes before curtain as well as the close of intermission. Disruptive, unruly guests, regardless of age, will be asked to leave. Cell phone ringers should be turned off.

Parking

Free parking is available in The Playhouse lots and on streets surrounding the theatre. After 5:00 PM daily, free parking is available in the Shops at Roosevelt's east/back parking lot. Parking in the west/front Shops parking lot is restricted to Shops customers at all times. The Playhouse is not responsible for loss of any personal property left in vehicles.

Performance Content

The Playhouse does not rate subject matter as sensitivities vary from person to person. Questions about content, age appropriateness, or other aspects of the show such as strobe lights and other theatrical affects should be directed to the ticket office.

Performance Schedule

The regular Signature Series performance schedule is 7:30 PM Wednesdays through Saturdays and 2:00 PM Sundays. The regular Kate Goldman Family Series performance schedule is 7:00 PM Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 4:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. The December performance schedule is 7:00 PM Thursdays and Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 5:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. All times are subject to change.

Preshow Talk

A preshow talk for each Signature Series performance, excluding the December show, will begin 30 minutes prior to curtain in the west lobby. The December show will have preshow music in the west lobby.

Safety Protocols

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
