

ABOUT

JESUS CHRIST SUPERSTAR

David R Kilpatrick, Director

Jesus Christ Superstar is about desperate people in desperate times with a focus on political and social drama rather than religious. There are four distinct levels of power: Roman occupiers who rule the country; royalty represented by King Herod; religious leaders including Caiaphas; and the Jewish people, who have the least amount of power. Every group has their own agenda and will do what they can to make their dreams come true.

KEY CHARACTERS

- Judas is trapped by three worlds: the religious/cultural authority of the Jewish elders, the political/legal authority of the Romans, and the hope that Jesus will bring about change.
- Simon Zealotes believes Jesus should raise an army and drive out the Romans.
- Mary Magdalene speaks for the completely faithful.
- Peter represents the more typical follower: When things go well, he believes, and when things get hard, he abandons his values.
- Pilate is the legal and military authority in Palestine. He has total authority of all matters which is why Caiaphas must go to Pilate to have Jesus crucified.
- Jesus represents a new way of looking at the world. It is youthful, exciting, rebellious, and joyous. All are excited by the possibilities that he represents. But, he has his own agenda and a timeline established by his father.

THE WORLD OF THE PLAY

- The set is a single location that serves as the "town center." Manmade elements are square and rigid. Nature is changing built items to make a new world.
- Costumes are post-apocalyptic Boho, which gives a range of textures and colors. Like the world of the play, the costumes are not to identify a specific period but allow the audience to create their own.



- Lighting is natural with day and night scenes rather than rock concert. The exception is dream moments such as "Superstar."
- All the events take place within a single week, from the celebration of the hero of Jesus to his vilification and crucifixion.

The crowd starts as fans of Jesus, then shortly thereafter turns against him. The crowd participates in the arrest and calls for Jesus' execution, possibly not believing it will really happen. Unfortunately, things go too far – a consequence of groupthink – and outcomes can't be controlled.

Whether this the first time you are experiencing *Jesus Christ Superstar* or your fiftieth, it is our hope that you will see something new and different today, something that will clarify or speak to you in a new way. This is the power of stories and why we go back to them, again and again. We are not the same as when we first heard the tale, nor should we be the same after experiencing the story again. This transformation is what makes art so valuable to us all.

ioined School of Rock. Cats. and The Phantom of the Opera, he equaled Rodgers & Hammerstein's record of four shows running simultaneously on Broadway. He is one of the select group of artists with EGOT status, having received Emmy, Grammy, Oscar, and Tony Awards. Andrew owns six London theatres including the iconic London Palladium and Theatre Royal, Drury Lane. Reopened in July 2021, the latter was completely restored and renovated at a cost of over £60 million. It was one of the biggest projects ever undertaken by a private theatre owner in recent times. His mantra is that every penny of profit made from his theatres is ploughed back into the buildings. Andrew is passionate about the importance of musical education and diversity in the arts. The Andrew Lloyd Webber Foundation provides 30 performing arts scholarships every year for talented students with financial need and supports a range of projects such as the Music in Secondary School Trust and commissioning research into diversity in theatre. Andrew has composed anthems for the 1978 World Cup in Argentina and for two Olympic ceremonies, including "Amigos Para Siempre", the official song of the 1992 summer games in Barcelona. He wrote "Let Us Love in Peace" for the concert on Ground


Zero in the aftermath of the attacks on The World Trade Center. And he has been honored to have been asked to compose for many royal occasions, the most recent being the anthem "Make a Joyful Noise" for the Coronation of King Charles III. Andrew was knighted in 1992, created an honorary life peer in 1997, and made a Knight Companion of the Most Noble Order of the Garter by King Charles III in 2024.



Tim Rice (*Lyrics*) has worked in music, theatre, and film since 1965, when he met Andrew Lloyd Webber, a fellow struggling songwriter. Rather than pursue Tim's ambitions to write rock or pop songs, they turned their

attention to Andrew's obsession: musical theater. Their first collaboration, *The Likes Of Us* (lyrics by Tim, music by Andrew), was an unsuccessful show

based on the life of Dr. Barnardo, the Victorian philanthropist. Their next three works together were much more successful: Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, Jesus Christ Superstar, and Evita. Tim has also worked with other distinguished popular composers such as Elton John (The Lion King, Aida), Alan Menken (Aladdin, King David, Beauty and the Beast), and Bjorn Ulvaeus and Benny Andersson (Chess). From Here to Eternity, with music by newcomer Stuart Brayson, coproduced with Lee Menzies, directed by Tamara Harvey, and with book by Bill Oakes, premiered in the West End at the Shaftesbury Theatre in 2013. He formed his own cricket team in 1973 and was president of the MCC in 2002. In 2013, he wrote and presented a 52-part series for BBC Radio 2, American Pie, a trawl through the music and musicians of every American State. He has won several awards, mainly for the wrong thing or for simply turning up.


The Playhouse is deeply committed to and supportive of diversity in local theatre. We work to include and serve all members of the community to the extent possible in stage productions and in our educational offerings.
